Seahorses are fish. They use their curled, flexible tail to hold onto plants. This stops them from floating away in the water. Humpback whale

Humpback whales are a type of sea mammal. They live in the water but are also mammals. They are powerful swimmers. They use their massive



tail fin, called a **fluke**, to move through the water and to 'jump' out of the water.

Humpback whales are mainly black or grey and white underneath. They do not have teeth. Instead, they have **baleen plates**, which look like a brush. They use these baleen plates to trap their food.

Humpback whales live in oceans around the world. They eat krill (like small shrimp) and small fish. They can live for up to 90 years. Did you know humpback whales sing songs?


